E is for Excellence



Business leaders who display faith at work have a commitment to excellence. Their performance plan is the result of disciplined and industrious evaluation. They enjoy their work as though working for God. They regularly review their performance and seek guidance from others, and they find satisfaction, wisdom, knowledge and joy in their work.

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What follows are insights and Scripture references for each of the five practices included in the LEADING Assessment that relate to **Excellence**. Each brief discussion is designed to affirm practices you already have in place, while revealing areas that you may want to begin or improve. GOING DEEPER WITH EXCELLENCE

Business leaders display excellence in their work.

In Os Guiness' book, *The Call*, he tells us that according to church tradition, yokes crafted by Jesus (when he was a carpenter) were still being used up to the 3rd century. Think of the incredible craftsmanship that was necessary for that to happen. Jesus modeled his own words, even in his work as a carpenter.

In "L is for Love God," you acknowledged that your work comes from God. God made you to work and wants you to find satisfaction in your work. Work is God's gift to you. When you engage in work, you are fulfilling a calling given to you by God. Numbers 30:2 says "When a man makes a vow to the Lord or takes an oath to obligate himself by a pledge, he must not break his word but must do everything he said." We work not for ourselves, but for God, and we do so in a spirit of thankfulness and humility. Our work performance should reflect that.

Reflection & Application	

Business leaders committed to excellence have performance plans that are the result of disciplined and industrious evaluation.

In Genesis 41, Pharaoh asked Joseph to interpret his troubling dream. Joseph revealed that God planned to give Egypt seven years of abundance followed by seven years of famine. When Joseph suggested that Pharaoh look for a discerning and wise man and put him in charge of the land of Egypt, stockpiling a fifth of the harvest during the seven years of abundance so that Egypt would survive, that made sense to Pharaoh. He appointed Joseph to be in charge. Pharaoh followed sound advice and strategy, and Egypt survived the famine.

Proverbs 21:5 says, "The plans of the diligent lead to profit as surely as haste leads to poverty." Performance plans need forethought, research and sound strategy. Hurry through a performance plan and you do so at your position's peril.

Reflection & Application			

Business leaders committed to excellence work as though working for God.

The Apostle Paul, in Colossians 3:23, gives us a formula for excellence. "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men." This verse identifies two key attributes of someone measuring up to God's view of excellence. They work at it with all their heart, and they are working for the Lord. This means the result is for His glory, not our own.

Some business leaders are driven towards excellence, but not the Biblical view of excellence. They use people and resources mercilessly to try to achieve perfection, not so that God gets the glory, but so that they do. This will likely be a highly controlling person, driven by tasks, without concern for relationships.

Consider the story of Mary and Martha in Luke 10. Martha was obviously a task-oriented woman. There's no doubt she did her work flawlessly, and the day Jesus visited, she naturally wanted to show her best. Jesus, however, was not impressed. Rather than grant Martha's request to condemn her sister Mary for her lack of helpfulness, Jesus rebuked Martha for being too fixated on the task at hand. Jesus knew that the relationship had far greater benefits than the meal Martha was trying to prepare. The point of this story is not to ignore the tasks, but instead recognize when excellence in relationships is more important than excellence in tasks.

Reflection & Application			

Business leaders committed to excellence regularly review their performance and seek guidance from others in areas they need to grow.

They are teachable. They do not think too highly of their own performance but know there is always room for improvement no matter how successful they are. Proverbs 9:8-9 says, "Do not rebuke mockers or they will hate you; rebuke the wise and they will love you. Instruct the wise and they will be wiser still; teach the righteous and they will add to their learning."

Business leaders committed to excellence are humble. They are not puffed up by their own intellect and skill. Isaiah 47 warns us not to trust in ourselves, our wisdom and knowledge or to think no one knows better than we do, lest disaster, calamity and catastrophe strike. These are wise words to heed.

Reflection & Application		

Business leaders committed to excellence find satisfaction, wisdom, knowledge and joy in their work.

Solomon points out in Ecclesiastes 3:9-15 that God has placed eternity in our hearts. He also points out that when we are satisfied with our toil, it is God's gift to us. One might conclude that to be satisfied with our occupations, we must measure all we do with the eternity God has placed in our hearts. Only what we do in obedience to God will endure forever.

In Luke 10:38-42, we read again about Jesus's visit to Mary, Martha and Lazarus' house. Martha was "worried" and "upset," and she receives Jesus' rebuke. When our work has us worried and upset for a significant period, something is wrong. At that point, maybe it is time to seek perspective from an elder or trusted friend.

Reflection & Application		

Closing Remark

Many people desire to be known for their excellence, yet few seem to rise to the challenge. God desires you to model excellence in and through the areas where He has called you to lead. Excellence is not the same as perfection, however. What God is looking for is sincerity of heart. Doing work with excellence comes with realizing it is truly God who you are serving and working for God's glory. This is what Biblical excellence looks like, and this is where we will find the true reward of excellence.

"Since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving." – Colossians 3:24.
